Through its unique analytical approach, social theories and research methods it expands our understanding of human relationships, cultures and institutions that profoundly shape both our lives and human history.

8. Lateral Entry Structure and Bridging Courses (if any):

1. Pathway for Associate Degrees Holders

- a) Students having completed Associate Degrees in Sociology shall be allowed admission in the fifth semester of the BS Sociology Program without any deficiency course.
- b) Where the disciplines of the Associate Degree and the undergraduate/equivalent degree program are different, students shall be required to complete deficiency courses through a bridging semester before the fifth semester.
- c) The minimum eligibility for admission in the fifth semester in above cases is 2.00/4.00

CGPA in the prior qualification i.e., Associate Degree.

2. Pathway for Conventional Two-Year BA/BSc/Equivalent Degree Holders

- a) Students having completed conventional two-year BA/BSc/equivalent degree programs shall be allowed admission in the fifth semester of the undergraduate/equivalent degree program, in which case students shall be required to complete deficiency courses through a bridging semester before commencement of the fifth semester as determined by the admitting university.
- b) The minimum eligibility for admission in the fifth semester in this case is 45% cumulative score in the prior qualification i.e., conventional two-year BA/BSc/equivalent degree programs.
- c) In an endeavor to adopt the above entry structure, the following bridging courses (12 Credit Hours) will be offered to students who are interested to enter the BS in Sociology Program in the fifth semester through the above two pathways.
- i. Sociology I (3 Credit Hours)
- ii. Sociology II (3 Credit Hours)
- iii. Introduction to Philosophy (3 Credit Hours)
- iv. Development of Social Thoughts (3 Credit Hours)

The students will be able to take these courses with the regular batches of BS Sociology (Semester 1- Semester 4).

3. Minor (Optional): As per HEC UG policy 2023, a minor is an option comprises of secondary concentration of courses, ordinarily in an academic discipline that complements the major. The requirements and prerequisites for a minor shall be determined by the concerned department provided that a minor must not be less than 12 credit hours.

While the BS Sociology is being offered as a Single Major, yet if students wish to undertake Sociology as a Minor along with any other major BS Program at IIUI, the following courses may be offered. The students will be able to undertake these courses along with regular batches of the BS Sociology Program.

Faculty members are recipient of prestigious awards such as Fulbright, Australian Award and DAAD. There is not professional development opportunities provided by the university as such as academic faculty.

The University has a central library for male and female students. We also have a well-equipped medical center where doctors are available and care is provided to students instantly. Laboratories are also available in departments where it is a requirement. In Sociology department we do not have any laboratory as such but we do need a computer laboratory to train students in ICT and Quantitative sociology/social statistics. The department has 5 class rooms but to increase the number of enrollment in the department and to grow we need more class rooms.

All measures are taken to maintain a healthy and safe environment in the department and university. There is on campus security available 24 hours a day. Cafeterias are available in male and female campuses to cater the needs of students and faculty. However, to provide a healthy environment for faculty more efforts are needed in terms of provision of independent office space, air conditioning

as the weather gets very hot and it becomes difficult for majority to work in a conducive environment.
