

Harvey G. Cox and Daisaku Ikeda *The Persistence of Religion: Comparative Perspectives on Modern Spirituality* London and New York: I.B.Tauris, 2009. Pages XVII

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This book presents a candid conversation or dialogue between two eminent scholars of religion, Harvey Cox (1929–), a former Professor of Divinity at Harvard University and a champion of civil rights movement, and Daisaku Ikeda (1928–), President of Soka University of America and Soka Gakkai International, a Buddhist, New Religious Movement.¹ Having vast academic and

Combining spiritual activities with social programs, Soka Gakkai International (SGI) is an international Nichiren Buddhist network with over 80 registered constituent organizations in 192 countries. It is arguably the world's largest socially engaged lay Buddhist association. SGI's founder,
